THE GOD OF SURPRISES (by Commissioners Paul and Jajuan Kellner)



It's been nearly ten years since we retired from our life as "active" officers of The Salvation Army so it may be a good time to reflect on that part of our period of service to the Lord, and in particular to those thirteen-plus years we lived and served in locations outside the USA. While the details of those years grow ever more fuzzy, their meaning seems to come into sharper focus with the passing of time. One thing is clear to us. The ultimate outcome of the years we served in those four countries, Jamaica, Haiti, Zimbabwe (twice), and Congo (Brazzaville), was not

what we expected at all, and certainly not what we had in mind when the whole adventure started.

In looking back, it is obvious to us now that any ideas we had about teaching them, "helping" them, or showing them how to do anything were futile. Any N. American feelings of superiority or smugness were quickly dashed on the rocks of daily reality. Those wonderful people whose lives we shared were every bit as capable as we were, every bit as intelligent (if not more so), every bit as dedicated to God, and even more enthusiastic about their Army service than we were. On top of this, they had a huge advantage in understanding their own cultures, historic values, ways of doing things, and, most importantly, the complex relationships which were the basis of everything in their lives.

After more than 13 years of daily observation and experience with them, we were just beginning to scratch the surface in understanding what was really going on. The best we could hope to do was come to the realization that all this was just a matter of having had our pilgrim path merge with theirs for a short while; walking hand-in-hand with them in Christian life and service, of growing and maturing together in Christ, and then of moving on as our paths again diverged. The best part of this aspect of those years was that, finally, the "they" and "we" became "us". We felt we were truly one in Christ together.

Even more startling, however, is the additional reality of what God seems to have been up to the whole time. It looks upon reflection, as if the whole experience was designed by Him, not for what we were going to do for Him or for the people, but what He was going to do for us. Our practical impact, in all the places we served, was no more than a grain of sand in the ocean. But the life-changes and spiritual understandings that God wrought in our own hearts were gigantic as far as we were concerned.

God used every day of each of those years to provide a platform for the growth of our own deep personal character and personal spiritual values. He was teaching us about the meaning of grace, the value of patience, the crucial need for self-control, the ability to read others through eyes of mercy, and the untold blessing of a forgiving heart. He was ever shining His searchlight on any vestiges of sinful pride in us, moving us on toward true humility of heart. God chipped away at us, sometimes pounded us, but eventually softened us. The people and places we lived in and served are little changed for our passing through, but we ourselves are totally different people.

Thank You, faithful Heavenly Father, for Your perfect wisdom and direction through all the days of our lives.
